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# **YOUNG SURVIVAL COALITION - BACKGROUND**

Young Survival Coalition (YSC), headquartered in New York City, is the largest national organization dedicated to the critical issues unique to young women and breast cancer.

YSC works with survivors, caregivers and the medical, research, advocacy and legislative communities to increase the quality and length of life for women who are diagnosed with breast cancer at the age of 40 or younger.

Three young breast cancer survivors founded YSC in 1998. All under age 35 at diagnosis, they were discouraged by the lack of information and resources available to young women, and they were concerned about the under-representation of this demographic in breast cancer research.

Unlike post-menopausal women who are overwhelmingly integrated into the design of clinical trials, young women diagnosed with breast cancer face higher mortality rates, fertility issues and the possibility and ramifications of early menopause.

YSC today has more than 160 Face 2 Face local networking groups nationwide and a vibrant online community board and Facebook community. The organization hosts the YSC Summit, the only national conference dedicated to the unique issues of young women with breast cancer. YSC also produces <u>free</u> educational resources, such as our navigator series, with useful information about every phase of treatment and survivorship. YSC seeks to change the face of breast cancer by: advocating for more research studies based on young women and breast cancer; educating young women about the importance of breast health; and serving as a support network to the 250,000 women living in the U.S. today who were diagnosed with breast cancer before their 41<sup>st</sup> birthday.

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# YOUNG WOMEN AND BREAST CANCER

Breast cancer in young women is not simply a disease diagnosed at a young age. Rather, it has biological characteristics and treatment concerns that differ from breast cancer diagnosed in postmenopausal women.

## THE FACTS

Despite common misconceptions, young women **can** and **do** get breast cancer. Here are the startling facts:

- Breast cancer is the most common cancer in women ages 15 to 39.1
- There is currently <u>no</u> effective breast cancer screening tool for women 40 and younger, most of whom have dense breast tissue that prevents routine mammograms from being a useful screening tool.
- Nearly 80 percent of young women diagnosed with breast cancer find their breast abnormality themselves.<sup>2</sup>
- The American Cancer Society projects 231,840 new cases of invasive breast cancer among U.S. women annually, as well as an estimated 60,290 additional cases of in situ breast cancer.<sup>3</sup>
  - It is estimated that 12,150 cases of breast cancer will be in women under age 40.<sup>3</sup> Approximately 26,393 women will be under 45 years of age when diagnosed.<sup>4</sup>
  - It is projected that more than 1,000 women under age 40 will die from breast cancer each year.<sup>3</sup>
- Young women are more likely to have aggressive subtypes of breast cancer, including triple negative and HER2+ disease<sup>5</sup>, larger tumor sizes and higher incidence of lymph node involvement.<sup>6</sup>
- Today, there are an estimated 250,000 breast cancer survivors living in the U.S. who were diagnosed at age 40 or younger.<sup>7</sup>

## THE ISSUES "COLLATERAL DAMAGE"

Young women diagnosed with breast cancer face myriad issues that may significantly impact their quality and length of life. These issues are often amplified for women diagnosed with metastatic breast cancer, including:

- Lack of research: As the incidence of young women with breast cancer is much lower than in older women, young women are often underrepresented in research studies.
- **Pregnancy**: Breast cancer is the most common form of cancer in women who are pregnant or have recently given birth<sup>8</sup>, occurring once in every 3,000 pregnancies.<sup>9</sup> An estimated 30 percent or more of all breast cancer in young women is diagnosed in the few years after a woman has had a baby.<sup>10</sup>
- **Early onset menopause**: Chemotherapy and hormonal treatments can sometimes bring on premature menopause, which can significantly impact quality of life.
- Fertility: Breast cancer treatment may affect a woman's ability and plans to have children.
- **Child rearing**: Many young women are raising small children while enduring treatment and subsequent side effects.
- **Financial challenges**: Breast cancer can dramatically impact a young woman's financial stability due to workplace issues, lack of sufficient health insurance and the cost of cancer care.
- **Body image**: It is challenging for some women to embrace their new body after breast cancer-related surgery and/or side effects of medically induced menopause.
- **Relationships and dating**: Whether married or single, intimacy issues may arise for women diagnosed with breast cancer.
